CORE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

CORE Strategic Position 2004-2009

A joint meeting of the Commission on Standards and Review and the Council on Rehabilitation Education (CORE) was held July 23, 2004 for the purpose of strategically positioning our organization for the next five years. This position will guide our activities and allocation of resources from 2004-2009. I would like to acknowledge Randy Gray who effectively facilitated this activity. The following Strategic Positions resulted from this meeting.

- I. Identity. A discussion was held on whether Rehabilitation Counseling is a separate and distinct profession with its own accreditation and certification process or a specialty area of practice within the counseling profession. This was a critical first discussion as it defines what we see ourselves as and, therefore, lays the foundation for further important positions.

We discussed the fact that rehabilitation counseling established the first accreditation process in the counseling profession (CORE) as well as the first certification process in the counseling profession (CRCC). This is a

proud legacy that we acknowledge. We also acknowledged the fact that the Council on the Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) and the National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC) were also established to accredit programs and certify professionals in the counseling profession. The American Association of State Counseling Boards (AASCB) adopted the portability policy which when adopted by individual state licensure boards will provide a national clearinghouse through which counselors will be able to register to better transfer their counseling license from one state to another. This policy defines eligibility from an educational perspective to participate in the clearinghouse to including a Master's degree in counseling or related field obtained from an institution of higher education that is regionally accredited by an accrediting body recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and include course content areas which includes the eight curricular domains established by CACREP. The 2004 CORE standards do include these eight curricular domains. Therefore graduates from CORE accredited programs could meet the educational criteria. The policy also included the CRC exam as an example of an acceptable exam for purposes of state licensure.

Counselor licensure is widely recognized as a critical regulatory issue for the practice of all counselors, including rehabilitation counselors. Participants in the Strategic Positioning meeting unanimously agreed that our identity is one of counselor with unique and specialized competency in disability and rehabilitation. The 2004 Standards clearly articulate this, as we include the first eight general curricular domains established by CACREP and recognize our specialized knowledge in the final two rehabilitation specific domains. The results of this position

lead to our adopting for CORE's purposes the following definition of a rehabilitation counselor:

A REHABILITATION COUNSELOR IS A COUNSELOR WHO POSSESSES THE SPECILIZED KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS, AND ATTITUDES NEEDED TO COLLABORATE IN A PROFESSIONAL RELATIONSHIP WITH PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES TO ACHIEVE THEIR PERSONAL, SOCIAL, PSYCHOLOGICAL, AND VOCATIONAL GOALS.

This definition was presented to a consortium of other rehabilitation counseling organizations for consideration. In addition to CORE, this definition has subsequently been endorsed by the National Rehabilitation Counseling Association (NRCA), the American Rehabilitation Counseling Association (ARCA), the National Council on Rehabilitation Education (NCRE), the American Deafness and Rehabilitation Association (ADARA) and the Commission on Rehabilitation Counselor Certification (CRCC).

- II. Credentialing: The strategic positioning discussion focused on licensure of counselors by states and the portability policy adopted by AASCB. There was unanimous agreement that CORE accredited programs and their graduates have a vested interest in the counselor licensure movement. It was noted that it is critical to have qualified rehabilitation counselors advocating for language in each state for inclusion in the statutory regulations. It was also agreed that to focus on our counseling function did not diminish our other essential functions of case management, consultation or advocacy.

The consortium of rehabilitation counseling organizations referenced above who in addition to endorsing the fact that we are a specialty of counseling has issued the following call to action:

As members of the rehabilitation counseling profession we must make an ongoing commitment to ensure that Rehabilitation Counselors have access to the credentials to practices and employment settings for which they are qualified.

This call-to-action is congruent with the Strategic Position of CORE that states:

CORE will move forward to advocate for inclusion in all credentials for which graduates of CORE accredited programs are eligible. The Council will advocate to ensure inclusion of Rehabilitation Counselors in state licensure laws for counselors.

Therefore CORE will continue to be an affiliate member of AASCB, as are CRCC, CACREP, NBCC, ARCA, and ACA. CORE will be holding a mid-year board meeting at AASCB in January 2005. Once again this year Dr. Donald Linkowski and I presented a program entitled "Council on Rehabilitation Education (CORE): Clarifying our Identity as Counselors."

- III. Aligning and networking other publics. Given our identity as counselors with specialized competence in working with persons with disability and our position on advocacy for inclusion of Rehabilitation Counselors in state licensure laws, this discussion focused on what our relationship with other organizations and specifically CACREP should be. In our discussions we referenced the traditions in professions such as medicine to licensure the generalist and certify the specialist. For us this means being licensed as counselors and certified by the specialty area, CRC. In this way mandatory state external regulation through licensure in addition to voluntary national internal professional certification combine to further protect the public, specifically the consumers of the rehabilitation counseling services provided by qualified professionals. This ensures that the profession's Code of Ethics, as well as the law, guide practice and serve as dual protections for consumers. This

partnership of the generalist licensed counselor with certification in the specialty area of practice is also advocated in the ACA Model Licensure Bill.

Furthermore, CACREP at its Board of Directors Meeting in July stated their position. In fact, they passed the following resolution that begs the question of why are there two accrediting bodies in counseling. The following memorandum was sent to CORE and was dated August 18, 2004:

The CACREP Board believes that rehabilitation counseling is a specialty of the counseling profession. This belief supports the statement made by ARCA President Tim Janikowski in his May 19th letter to ACA Executive Director Richard Yep that “rehabilitation counseling is a counseling specialty that traces its history back to 1958 with the creation of American Rehabilitation Counseling Association (ARCA).” Because of this belief, CACREP believes that it would be beneficial for the counseling profession and counselor preparation programs if there were only one accrediting organization to uniformly serve all specialty areas. Such action would be a unifying force in the profession and provide clarity to the publics being served. Therefore, the CACREP Board would like to work toward that goal and would be willing to fund representation to future meetings if there were a clear statement from each of our organizations to work toward that goal.

This memorandum was also sent to the leadership of CRCC, NBCC, ACA, and ARCA.

The Strategic Position adopted is that CORE will continue its efforts to collaborate and network with CACREP for the mutual benefit of our respective organizations. Given our position, CORE and CACREP are holding exploratory discussions as charged by each of our Boards on collaborative efforts that will be to our mutual benefit. A

meeting of the Executive Committees of our organizations was held in January.

In the current environment of limited resources and the relationship between access to practice and credentialing it would be unrealistic to avoid the question of joining forces with other organizations, especially CACREP. In this way we would be more able to clearly communicate to the public with a unified voice that we as counselors seek to have access to the credentials to practices and employment settings for which we are qualified.

CACREP has called the question and CORE can no longer ignore it. We have an obligation to the counseling profession to seriously and carefully weigh the costs and benefits of joining forces.

- IV. Recognizing a Continuum of Rehabilitation Education. During our strategic positioning discussions regarding the focus of our internal activities, we affirmed the importance of supporting a comprehensive rehabilitation career ladder through rehabilitation education from the associate through the doctoral degree. The Mission of CORE was used to guide our considerations.

The mission of the Council on Rehabilitation Education, Inc. (CORE) is the accreditation of Rehabilitation Counselor Education (RCE) Programs to promote the effective delivery of rehabilitation services to individuals with disabilities by promoting and fostering continuing review and improvement of master’s degree level RCE Programs. It may also serve to assist and advise in the development and refinement of university-based programs related to the education of persons for professional endeavors associated with the rehabilitation of people with disabilities.

It was decided that our focus for the next five years would be to continue with the accreditation of master’s degree level rehabilitation counselor education and the

implementation of the 2004 CORE Standards. In addition, it was the consensus of the group not to consider the accreditation of doctoral education at this time.

It was also the consensus of the group to continue to recognize the continuum of rehabilitation education through the Undergraduate Registry. In fact a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed between the Council and the Committee on Undergraduate Education (CUE) at the 2004 CORE Annual Meeting. The purpose of this memorandum was to delineate the relationship between CORE and CUE.

The mission of the Committee on Undergraduate Education (CUE) is the registration of post-secondary education programs in disability and rehabilitation studies that prepare students for graduate school in rehabilitation counseling and for entry-level professional employment in community rehabilitation and disability services; fostering the continued improvement of these programs; and promoting international development of disability and rehabilitation service education at the pre-graduate level; such other related activities as may be approved by the Council on Rehabilitation Education.

The MOU is premised on the following assumptions. CORE and CUE recognize the importance of providing a comprehensive rehabilitation career ladder system to ensure adequate availability of qualified personnel to provide rehabilitation services to all individuals with disabilities. CORE emphasizes the importance of training professional rehabilitation counselors to perform the functions that research has identified as essential elements of professional rehabilitation counseling. CUE emphasizes undergraduate rehabilitation education that prepares students for entry-level positions in community rehabilitation and disability services. CUE also seeks to prepare qualified students for admission to

graduate study in rehabilitation counseling programs. CORE has recognized these efforts by CUE and supports the varied roles that undergraduate trained rehabilitation personnel may fill in the complex rehabilitation service delivery system. CUE has been diligent when articulating the functions of personnel it prepares to not characterize the preparation as “counselor training.” CORE and CUE value consistent and meaningful communication to foster mutual collaboration and academic articulation among rehabilitation education programs.

The CUE is now a committee reporting directly to CORE. It is critical to note that through CUE, CORE sanctions the registration and not the accreditation of undergraduate programs. CORE believes it is critical for all stakeholders to consider the role of undergraduate education in the continuum of rehabilitation education and the implications for credentialing. CORE will be working with the CUE to gather data for the purpose of making informed decisions over the next five years.

- V. Organizational Structure. The final area of Strategic Positioning considered the organizational structure. It was decided that CORE will begin a comprehensive review of its organizational structure in regard to implementing the 2004 Standards and increasing the efficiency of its accreditation procedures.

The CORE Strategic Position in these five domains will guide our actions and allocation of resources. It is critical that as an organization we stay on task to ensure that we are proactive, intentional, and responsible in realizing our mission.

Executive Director's Report 2003-2004

(As Presented at the CORE Annual Meeting in
July 2004)

This year was especially busy with follow-up work relating to the new 2004 Standards. This means revision of all of our documents and website that is still underway. Some changes were made in the site reviewer manual and incorporated as part of the training that was done at the NCRE meeting in Tucson in February. Appreciation is expressed to Marv Kuehn for his help in co-conducting the Site Reviewer Training. Twelve new reviewers were trained. I will conduct site reviewer training at NAMRC in Chicago on July 21, 2004.

The 2003 CORE News was completed and added to the CORE website. This year a picture was included in the newsletter and hopefully I will be able to continue with more pictures so we can personalize the publication more than in the past. Notices of the availability of the newsletter were distributed to the NCRE listserv, ASPA, and CHEA lists as well as to others.

Presentations were made relating to the 2004 Standards with Dennis Maki at NCRE in Tucson and at the American Association of State Counseling Boards (AASCB) in San Diego in January. It is important that CORE and other rehabilitation organizations have visibility at AASCB on a continuing basis to educate the state boards about our standards. We also need to work to promote more people in rehabilitation counseling to get appointed to state counseling licensure boards.

This year site reviewers were assigned to visit 16 programs. Site reviewer reports were reviewed, edited, and revised as appropriate.

Continued communication was maintained with ASPA, CHEA, the DC Accreditors, and CACREP. I attended the Fall ASPA meeting in Phoenix in September where we celebrated the organization's ten-year anniversary. ASPA continues to be a strong advocate and support for specialized and professional accrediting organizations. CORE is among the chartered members of ASPA

Most recently a meeting was attended to explore collaborative activities between and among CORE, CACREP, NBCC, and CRCC. The meeting took place on May 24, 2004 in Alexandria, VA. We identified some possible ways we could further collaborate and questions to take back to our respective boards. I am pleased to say that communication between CORE and CACREP was facilitated because of the contact we have maintained for many years and through our doing joint site visits together.

This year, in spite of being semi-retired from GWU, I was not able to keep up with the volume of work that was created by adopting the new standards. For example I have not completed the CORE profile nor have I revised the survey questionnaire forms. It's a big job and the Commission will need to assign a committee to work with me on this. We also need to review and revise all our documents, starting with the Accreditation Manual. Sue has helped a lot in working in editing these materials, but there are things that she cannot do.

I recommend that the Commission and CORE consider the following recommendations:

Review what we post as public information regarding an institution's accreditation and consider increasing the level of information that pertains to program quality. This is in response to urging by congress to better inform consumers and possibly improve our accountability as an accreditation organization. CHEA has produced a publication that relates to this entitled, "Accreditation and the Provision of Additional Information to the Public about Institution and Program Performance." I will have this available at the meeting. Perhaps this is an item for Strategic Planning.

Appoint a CORE News editor to work with me to improve our newsletter. I do the best I can with the limited time I have, but need someone to help improve the newsletter. Right now it is bare bones, and feedback indicates that most are unaware of it or are not impressed.

We need to outsource the data entry for the profile

that is generated from the annual report we receive from each program. I can handle the analysis, but data entry is a problem since my eyes tire easily and I find it a tedious task. A graduate student could do a much better job than I. Thus, I suggest we allocate \$200 to pay a student to enter the data into SPSS. I can provide the template.

I wish to express appreciation again to Sue for all her work and patience and for her pleasant personality. Also the Foundation has provided excellent support to CORE and Susan, Staci, and Cindy needs to be commended for their help. It's amazing how we can do so much, for so little.

Also I attended meetings of ASPA and CHEA this fall and wish to point out some directions accreditation is moving, primarily in response to proposed new amendments to the Higher Education Act. Two areas that we will need to discuss in much more depth are *accountability via greater public disclosure* and *increased focus on educational outcomes, rather than inputs* by accreditation organizations. CORE and the rehabilitation counseling professional community would do well to be proactive in these areas rather than to wait until we are required to comply. I expect that these areas will be incorporated by the U.S. Department of Education and by the Council on Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) in their new recognition requirements. What can we and should we disclose about the accreditation review of a program? What objectively measured outcomes can we rely upon as part of a program's review? Also, should the results of these measures (in the aggregate) be disclosed to the public? The rehabilitation education community must discuss and decide these important matters as soon as possible. The CORE leadership needs your input. DCL

The Committee on Undergraduate Education

CORE'S Committee on Undergraduate Education (CUE) met at the RSA/CSAVR/NCRE meeting in Washington, DC in October. There are 24 programs from three countries on the current Undergraduate Registry. These are programs that have applied and met the Registry standards (as

found on the CORE website). CUE has been working on a revision of these standards for the past two years, but they are not quite ready for implementation. New programs that are interested in applying for the Registry should follow the guidelines on the website. Since the original registry process was for five years, there are a number of programs that need to be reviewed a second time. These programs will be contacted in the near future with a more detailed explanation of the process. For those of you planning to attend the NCRE meeting in Tucson in February, please plan to attend the CUE meeting there.

Town Meeting on the Role of Undergraduate Education in Rehabilitation to Be Held at NCRE Meeting

The CORE Board at its Midyear Board meeting decided to work with the Committee on Undergraduate Education (CUE) to gather information relevant to the role of undergraduate education in the continuum of rehabilitation education and the implications for credentialing. The first step in this process is a meeting scheduled at the NCRE meeting in Tucson Saturday, February 19, from 8 - 10 a.m. The meeting will be held in the Park Theater at the conference hotel. All educators are welcome to attend this Town Meeting. We would like this to be a fairly informal exchange of information between CORE and those who have an interest in undergraduate programs. Dennis R. Maki, CORE President and David Perry, CUE Chair will facilitate this meeting where we will have a discussion in which we can begin to determine what the important issues are and what data is needed to make wise and responsible decisions. We will also discuss what further information is needed and what strategies could be taken to gather pertinent information, such as surveys of affected constituencies (e.g., higher education administrators, graduate program coordinators, undergraduate program coordinators, students, consumers, etc.).

HISTORY: The Council on Rehabilitation Education (CORE) was formed in June 1971 and incorporated as a not-for-profit organization in Washington, DC, in 1972. CORE has since reincorporated in the State of Illinois. In 1975, CORE was recognized by COPA, and was subsequently recognized by CORPA. CORE is now recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA).

MISSION: The mission of CORE is the accreditation of RCE Programs in order to promote the effective delivery of rehabilitation services to individuals with disabilities by promoting and fostering continuing review and improvement of master's degree level RCE Programs. CORE's accreditation process promotes program self-improvement rather than outside censure. A concomitant purpose of the process is to meet the personnel needs of both public and private rehabilitation agencies by providing graduates who have the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary to provide rehabilitation counseling services to individuals with physical, mental, and/or emotional disabilities.

COMPOSITION: CORE is composed of representatives from each of five national professional organizations that are concerned with rehabilitation counseling: the National Rehabilitation Counseling Association (NRCA), the American Rehabilitation Counseling Association (ARCA), the National Council on Rehabilitation Education (NCRE), the Council of State Administrators of Vocational Rehabilitation (CSVAR), and the National Council of State Agencies for the Blind (NCSAB). CORE also has two public members: one who represents the consumer public and one who represents the public at large. In addition to the granting of program recognition, CORE serves as a forum for the evaluation of accreditation policies and practices as well as the effectiveness of accreditation efforts.

CONSULTATION SERVICES: Institutions interested in establishing, reorganizing or expanding an RCE Program can obtain program development consultation services from CORE. Information regarding the service can be obtained from the Executive Director of CORE.

Candidate for Accreditation: Granted to programs in the early stages of development or implementation, up to the point of graduating ten (10) students. This recognition provides evidence that a program complies with those standards applicable at the program's stage of development. Accreditation: Granted to programs that have been fully operational long enough to allow for the objective assessment of the professional performance of graduates. This recognition provides evidence that a program complies with all standards and is deemed able to maintain that level of compliance through the duration of the recognition.
